ADMISSIONS for 2008-2009

- Completion of the (HS) Core Subject Requirements
- A Transfer GPA of 2.50 or higher
- Submission of scores on an acceptable admission test such as SAT or ACT, unless the applicant has earned at least 40 transferable quarter-credits after high school graduation

Admission decisions are based on much more than grade point average (GPA) or predicted academic performance. The Comprehensive Review is a holistic assessment of an applicant's academic performance and personal qualities and achievements. Information provided by the applicant in the personal statement plays an integral role in admissions. The comprehensive review includes the following assessment areas:

- Level of academic achievement including cumulative transfer GPA based on all transferable college-level courses attempted;
- Rigor of curriculum; and consistency in course completion
- Well-defined academic goals
- Preparation for intended major
- Plan for timely completion of a bachelor's degree
- Completion of foreign language through the 103-level, or equivalent, when applying to Arts and Sciences or Social Work
- Evidence of a need to enroll at the UW and the availability of the applicant's intended academic program at other Washington public educational institutions
- Academic or artistic awards and achievements, community service, work experience, or research that demonstrates success or potential contributions to the University and community
- Improved grades after an extended absence from college or evidence of a new maturity in approaching college work
- Cultural Awareness
- Perseverance in attaining higher education in spite of personal adversity, disability, or economic disadvantage
- Admission test scores, if provided

Among community college transfer students, the highest admission priority will be given to those with academic associate degrees and those with 90 transferable credits taken in preparation for a professional academic major. Applicants with fewer than 90 credits may also be admitted when early transfer is advisable, but the number of such transfers will remain small. The University allows a maximum of 90 credits of lower – division transfer course work to be applied toward a UW degree.

An applicant's preparation for the intended major plays a **significant** role in the admission decision. Therefore, students are asked to complete the Planning worksheet for their intended major as part of the University admission application.

- \$50 nonrefundable application fee
- Academic Planning Worksheet
For those who apply online, the worksheets are converted into an online grid that is integrated into the application. Applicants who use the PDF version of the application will download the worksheet from admit.washington.edu/BeforeYouApply/Transfer/Plan/Worksheets
- Personal Statement
- Official high school transcript
- Two official transcripts from each college or university attended- Send transcripts showing course work through the quarter most recently completed before the application deadline.
- Official test scores from ACT or SAT- Applicants with fewer than 40 transferable credits completed at the time of application must include test scores.

TIPS FOR WRITING THE PERSONAL STATEMENT

Tell us who you are. We encourage you to share those aspects of your life that are not apparent from your transcripts. In providing the “backdrop” for your academic achievements and choices, describe your passions and commitments, your goals, a personal challenge faced, a hardship overcome, or the cultural awareness you’ve gained.

Tell us your story. Be concise, but tell the whole story even if you need a little more space. You have our assurance that all of the information you provide in your application and statement will remain confidential.

Be specific. Personal Statements too often include sentences such as “I’ve always wanted to be a Husky” or “My whole family attended the UW.” Though this may be important to you personally, such reasons are not particularly valuable to the Admissions staff. Why? Because they don’t tell us anything distinctive about your experiences and ultimate goals.

Write like a college student. Your Personal Statement should reflect the experience and maturity of someone who has already attended college. It should reflect your understanding of the components of an undergraduate education, such as general education and the major. We want to read how your academic and personal experience to date, in concrete, specific ways, fits into your academic, career and personal goals.

*All UW students must complete between 7-10 credits of writing-intensive ("W") courses, in addition to the 5 credits of English Composition. Many students transfer courses which required enough writing to qualify as "W" courses. A "W" usually means that a course requires either several short papers or a term paper with a required revision.

Things to consider as you are preparing to transfer to University of Washington:

Students who enter with an associate degree have NOT automatically satisfied the university's general education requirements.

Many courses required by a transfer associate degree will count toward UW's general education requirements, but the degree does not automatically satisfy our requirements. After you transfer to the UW, you will meet with an adviser who will determine how the courses you have already completed count toward UW's graduation requirements. Almost all transfer students will have some requirements yet to be completed. This is entirely acceptable. Students who start at the UW as freshmen are not expected, nor even encouraged, to complete their general education requirements in their first two years. It is more important in your freshmen and sophomore years to decide on a major and begin completing its requirements, while taking some general education courses.

Consider completing a full year of foreign language before transferring.

Although the UW admission requirement is just two high school years of a foreign language, many UW students must take more foreign language in college to meet the UW's graduation requirements. UW's College of Arts and Sciences, College of Education, and School of Social Work, require completion of a foreign language through the third quarter with at least a 2.0 grade.

If possible, try to complete any sequences before you transfer.

Because the organization of the material can vary from college to college, you may have trouble if you transfer in the middle of a sequence. Good examples of this are biology, chemistry, and math.

Many UW majors have admission requirements.

In addition, some of these admit students only once a year. Almost all the admission requirements of these majors can be completed at Washington community colleges. Again, if you choose one of these majors and haven't started the coursework in your first two years, it may take you much longer to graduate than you had planned.

UW students are expected to be admitted to a major before they reach 105 credits.

If you transfer in with 90 credits, we give you only one quarter to decide on a major. We will allow you more time if necessary to complete the admission requirements of your chosen major, but we expect you to have given the matter some thought before your junior year. And, if your choice of major has competitive admission, you may be required to plan for an alternate major. This is a lot to think about during your first quarter at the UW, when you will be making many other adjustments in your life as well.

Most students run through several potential majors before they find the subject they enjoy most. Give yourself time to do this by starting to investigate potential majors early on. Each quarter, one or two of your courses should be a subject you are considering as a major, or a requirement of your intended major.

Attend a Transfer Thursday!

If you are considering transferring to the University of Washington, Transfer Thursdays are for you! Every Thursday afternoon is dedicated to serving prospective transfer students. At Transfer Thursday you can attend an admission information session, talk one-on-one with an academic and/or admissions counselor, attend one of many departmental or preprofessional program information sessions, go on a tour of campus, and more, all in preparation for transferring into the UW.
