

University of Oregon 2007-2008 General Education Requirements

The following are PCC courses that satisfy the requirements

Students would need to satisfy all 3 requirements

1.

Bachelor of Arts, Fine Arts, or Science: (Additional requirements on back page)

Students must complete a minimum of **45 credits - 15 or 16 credits (4 courses)** in approved group-satisfying courses in each of three general education groups: **Arts and Letters, Social Science, and Science**. Each group must include (1) at least two courses with the same subject code and (2) at least one course with a different subject code. No more than three courses with the same subject code may be used to fulfill the 45 credit requirement. **Only one course from the student's major may be used to satisfy group requirements.**

OR

Bachelor of Architecture, Education, Interior Architecture, Landscape Architecture, or Music

Students must complete a minimum of **36 credits - 12 credits** in approved group satisfying courses in each of three general education groups: **Arts and Letters, Social Science, and Science**. Each group must include at least two courses with different subject codes. Two groups must each include at least two courses with the same subject code. No more than three courses with the same subject code may be used to fulfill the total 36 credit requirements. **Only one course from the student's major may be used to satisfy group requirements.**

Courses in italics also satisfy multicultural requirements.

If you chose the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science option, you will also need to complete one of the following:

ADDITIONAL BACHELOR OF ARTS (B.A.) REQUIREMENT: The B.A. degree requires proficiency in a second language. The second-language requirement may be met in one of the following ways:

1. Completion of at least the third term, second year of a second-language course taught in the language, with a grade of C- or P or better
2. Satisfactory completion of an examination administered by the appropriate language department, showing language proficiency equivalent to that attained at the end of two years of college study
3. For students whose native language is not English: providing high school or college transcripts to the Office of Admissions as evidence of formal training in the native language **and** satisfactory completion of WR 121 and either WR 122 or 123

OR

ADDITIONAL BACHELOR OF SCIENCE (B.S.) REQUIREMENT: The B.S. degree requires proficiency in mathematics or computer and information science or a combination of the two. The requirement may be satisfied in one of the following ways, depending on the student's experience in mathematics. Courses must be completed with grades of C-, P, or better. *These math tracks may not be your only choice in completing BS requirements. Please check with U of O for more options.*

- If you placed at or below MTH 95: after completing MTH 95 take 3 courses from : MTH 111A, MTH 111B, MTH 111C, MTH 112, MTH 116, MTH 243, MTH 244
- If you placed at MTH 111: After completing MTH 111 take 2 courses from: MTH 112, MTH 231, MTH 241, MTH 243, MTH 244, CS 162
- Students who have completed MATH 111 and the additional prerequisite course may complete the requirement with 1 course chosen from: MTH 211, MTH 212, MTH 213, (if MTH 211 is chosen, students must also take MTH 212 & MTH 213) MTH 232, MTH 251, MTH 252, MTH 253, MTH 254, MTH 261, CS 161, CS 162, CS 260
