### Business School/Program Admission

Admission to the Business school/program of an OUS institution is not guaranteed upon completion of the ASOT-Business degree. It is strongly recommended that students contact the specific OUS campus Business school/program early in the first term of their ASOT Business program to be advised of additional requirements **as they are subject to change without notice.**

### Transfer Status

Any student who holds an Associate of Science/Oregon Transfer in Business degree who transfers to any institution in the Oregon University System will have met the lower-division general education requirements of that institution's baccalaureate degree programs. Students transferring with this degree will have junior standing for registration purposes.

For transfer students graduating from high school in 1997 and thereafter, the Oregon University System (OUS) has a second language admission requirement: two terms of a college-level second language with an average grade of C- or above, OR two years of the same high school level second language with an average grade of C- or above OR satisfactory performance on an approved second language assessment of proficiency. Demonstrated proficiency in American Sign Language meets this second language admission requirement.

### Comprehensive Credit and GPA Requirements

- 90 total credits with minimum of at least 30 PCC credits
- 24 PCC credits must count toward degree requirements
- Minimum overall GPA of 2.0
- Non-traditional, transferred, or challenge credit may not be used toward the 30 PCC credit requirement to establish residency, waiver process does not apply
- Developmental Ed courses may not be applied to degree
- Transfer credits accepted for letter grade C or higher
- Transfer grades of 'pass' accepted if no letter grade is required
