PROJECT DESCRIPTION

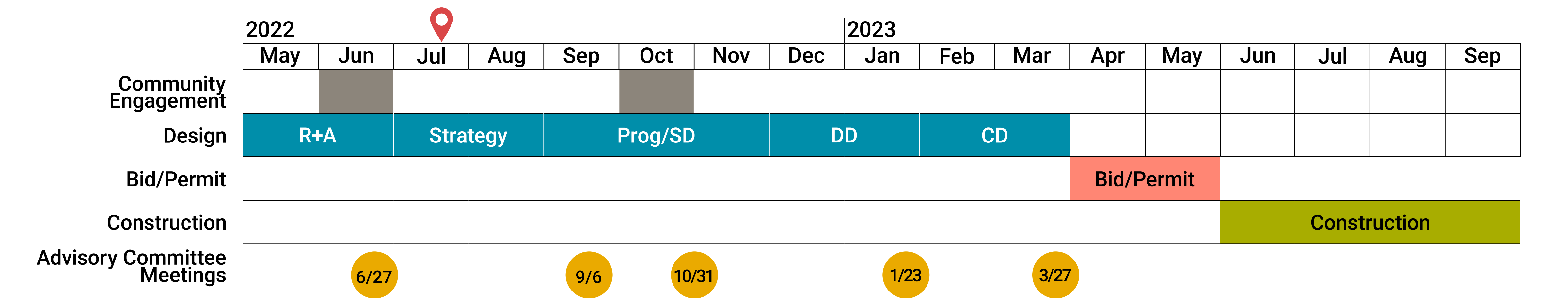
This project will enhance the exterior signage and wayfinding throughout the Sylvania Campus. The work includes an assessment of existing signage, the development of a wayfinding strategy utilizing PCC's Standards and stakeholder feedback, and the installation of new exterior signage.

Exterior sign types include

- Site identification
- Building identification
- Vehicular wayfinding
- Parking Lot and Parking Space identification
- Permit and Pay Station identification
- Public transportation and biking
- Pedestrian wayfinding
- Accessible wayfinding
- Regulatory (No Smoking, Designated Smoking Area)

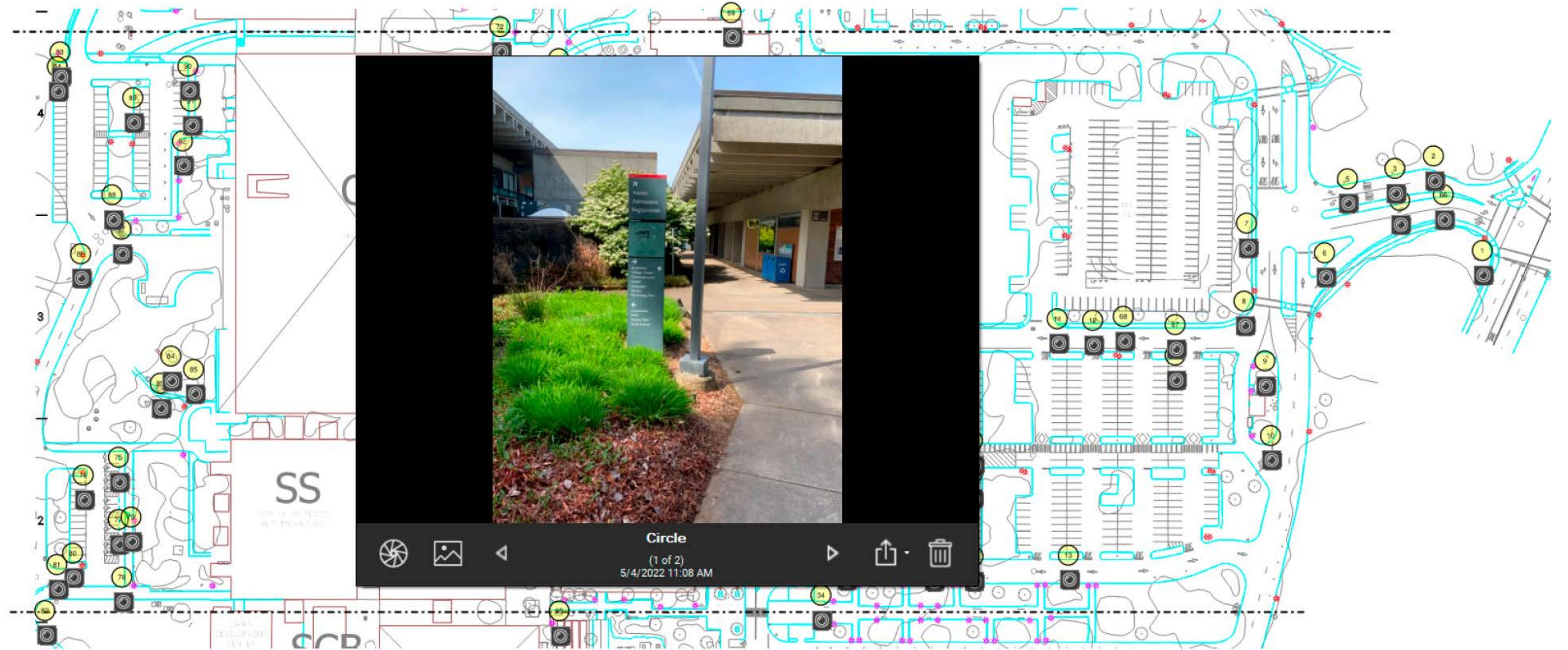

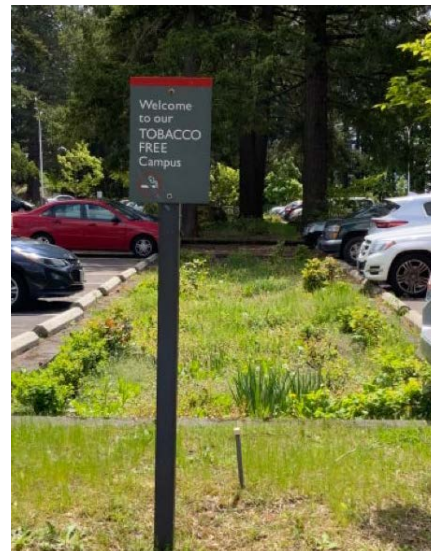

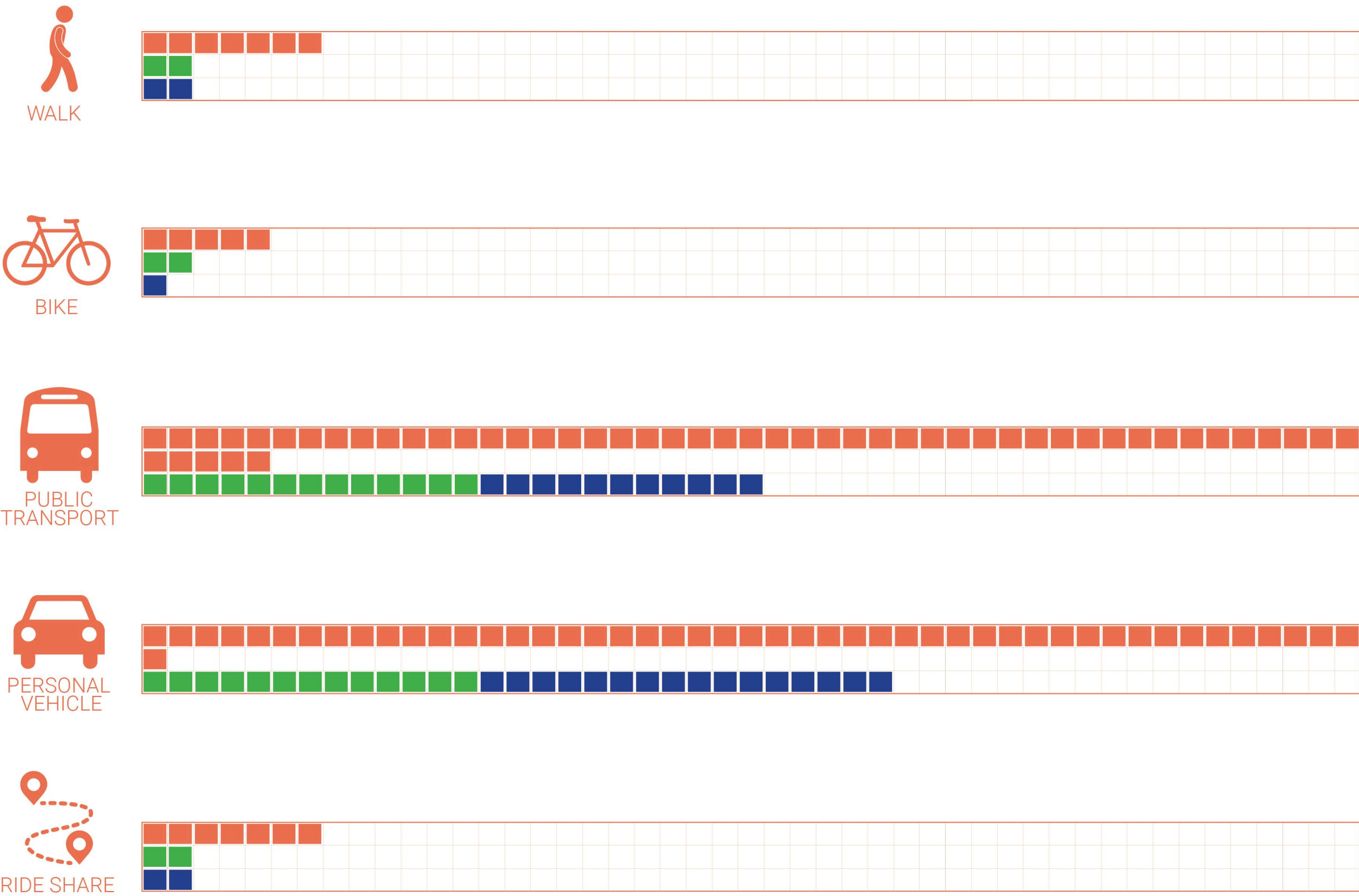
Sylvania Campus Framework Fall 2018

PRIOR COMMUNITY INPUT

Workshop and Online Survey Spring 2021

PCC’s Office of Planning & Capital Construction held a series of campus visioning workshops to inform the college’s district-wide Facilities Plan. An online campus survey was launched alongside the campus workshop to gather information from those who could not attend the workshops.


Several questions received responses at both the virtual workshops and online survey requesting improvements to signage.

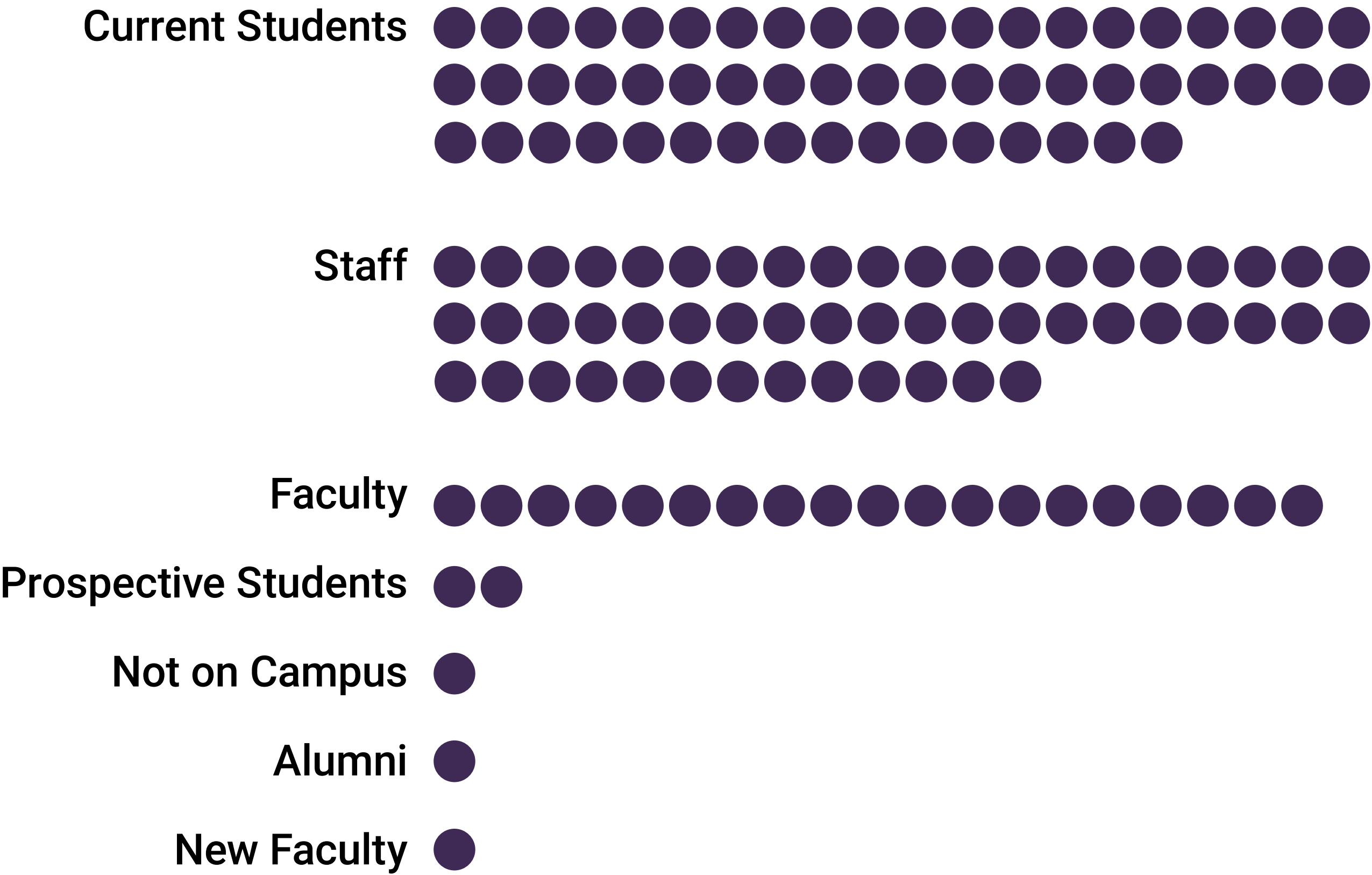

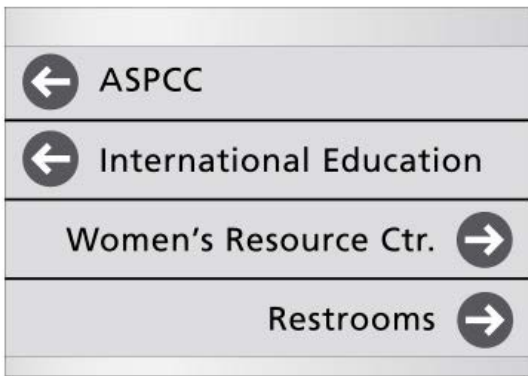

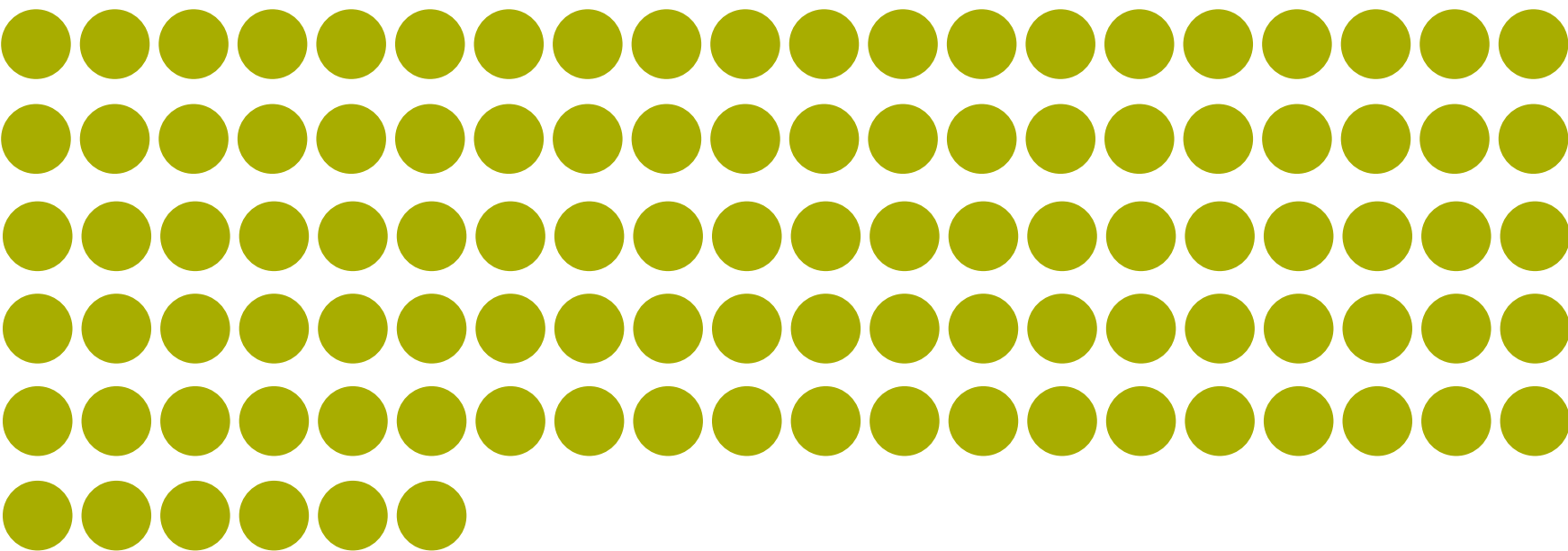

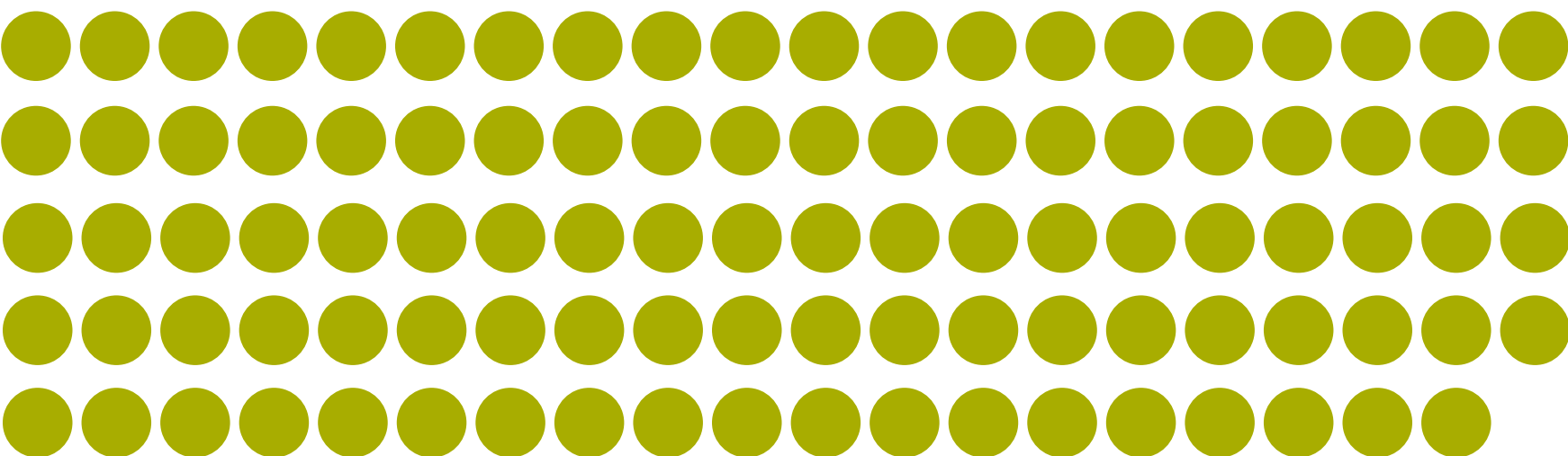

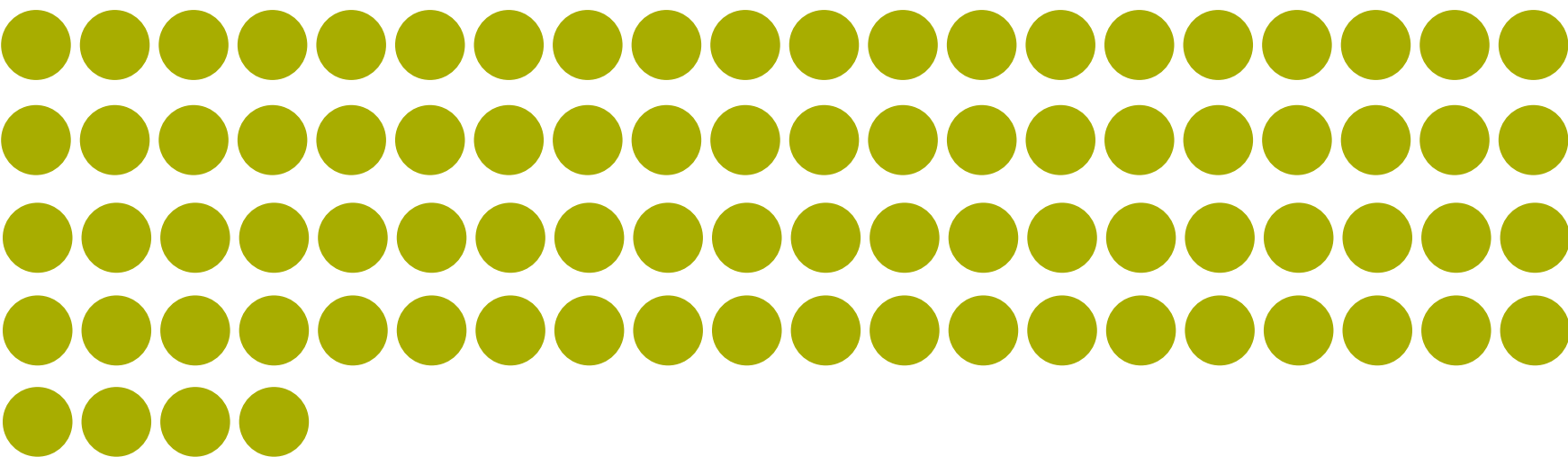

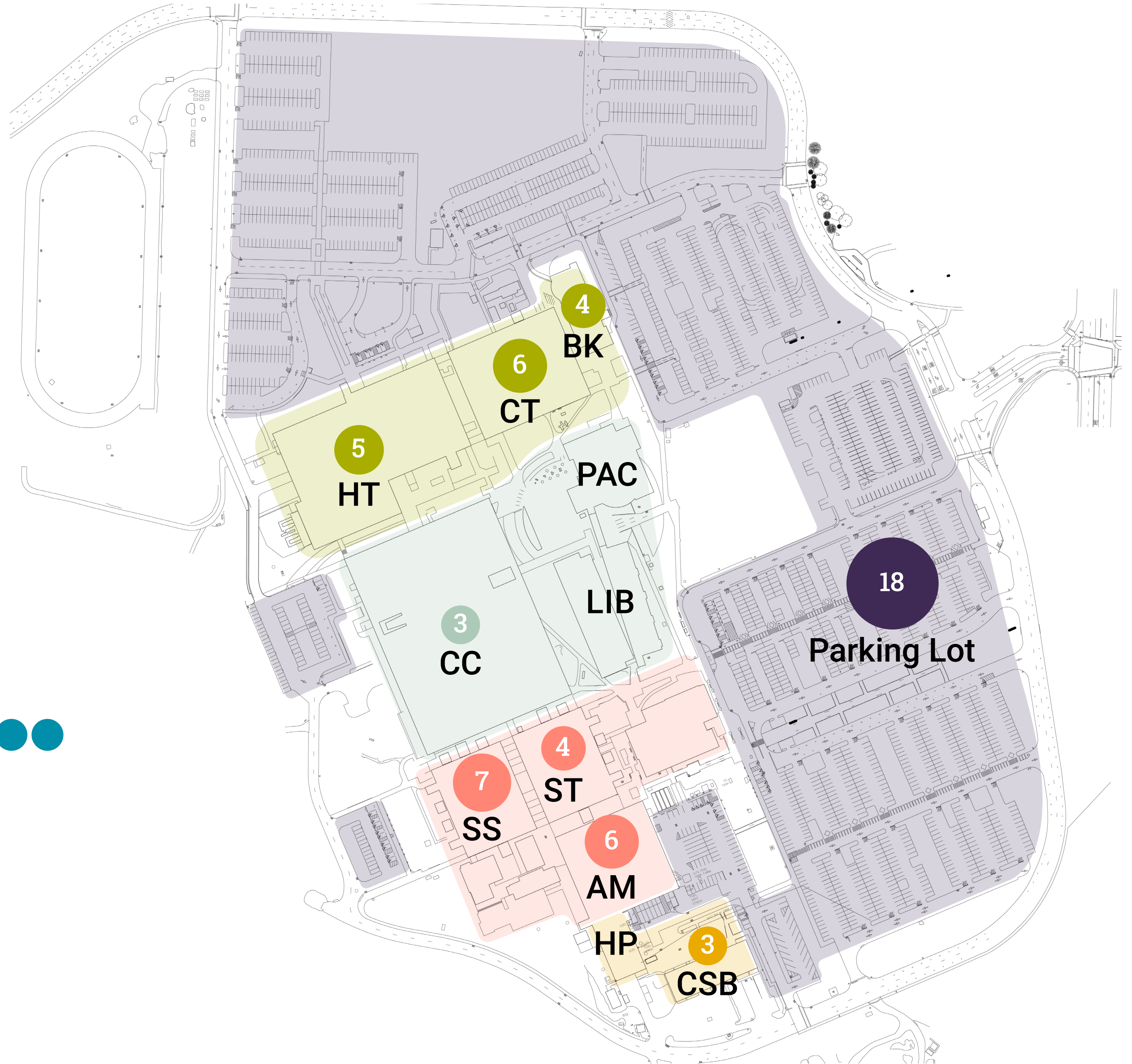

“Difficult to know which stairs will allow me to access other buildings and at which level”

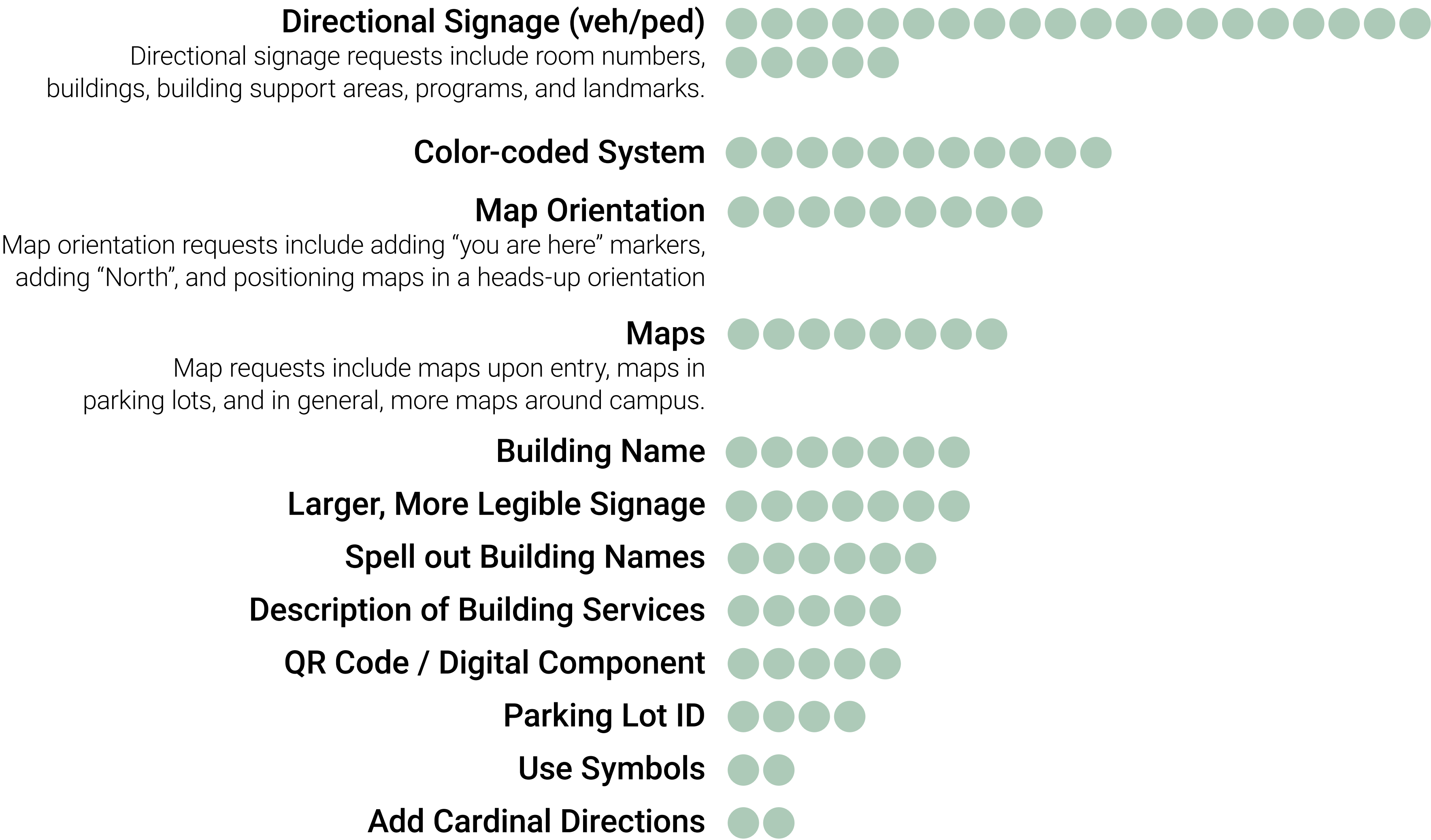
“Students are CONSTANTLY asking where the bookstore is.”

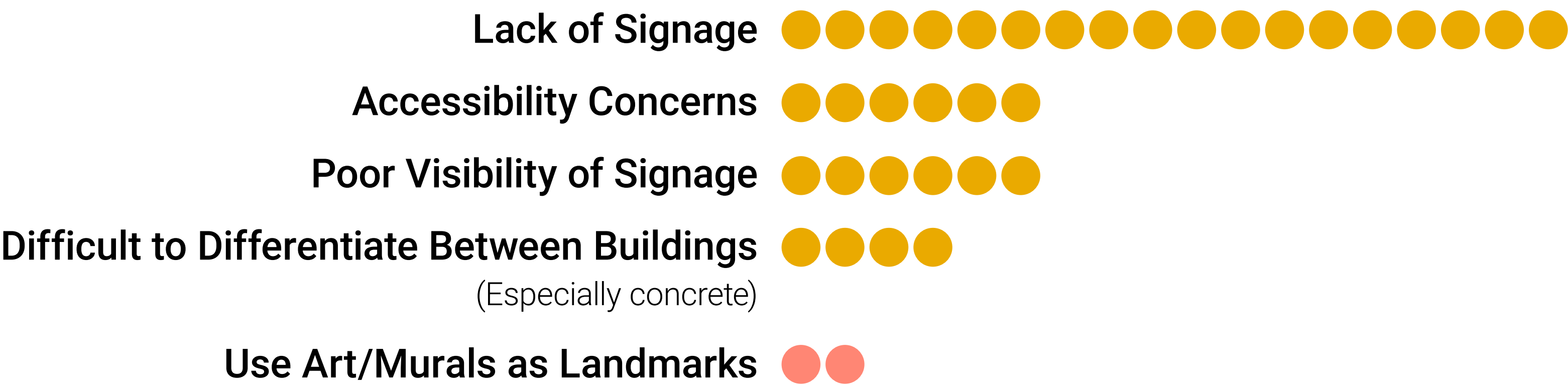

Q5: Any additional details you would like to add about your personal experience navigating the Sylvania Campus?

“Wayfinding signage may need to include some interior signs if possible because some ADA routes need to use elevators.”

“Depending where you [are] coming from, the ground level is different and it is confusing.”

“I ugly cried trying to find my ceramics classroom more than once :(”

“Try accessibility navigating while using a wheelchair/ crutches, some signage points down stairs but not to where the elevators are located.”

“I had to take a lot of time walking and driving around looking at the downloadable maps available on pcc.edu - that is not a safe way to navigate while driving.”

Current overhead identification signage is unsafe due to the wind conditions created in certain areas of campus.

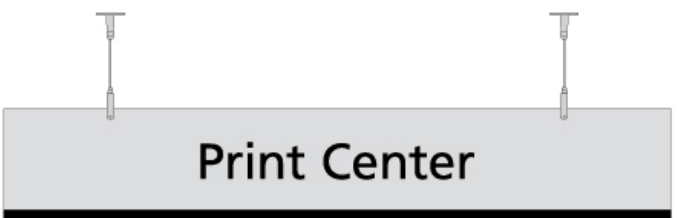
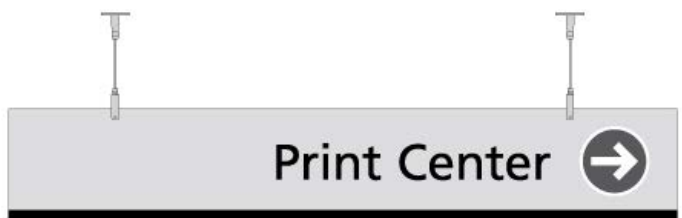
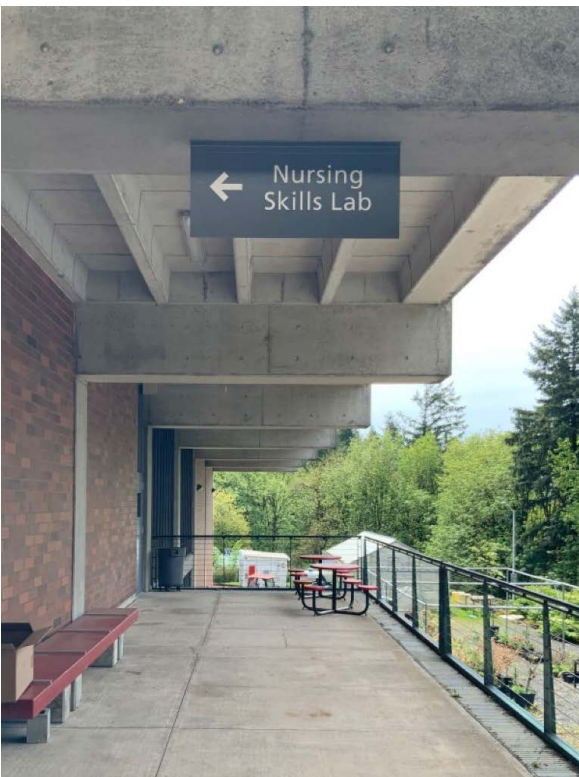
Room signage is not currently in the scope of this project, but those that appear on the exterior should be considered as part of the holistic wayfinding experience across Sylvania’s campus.

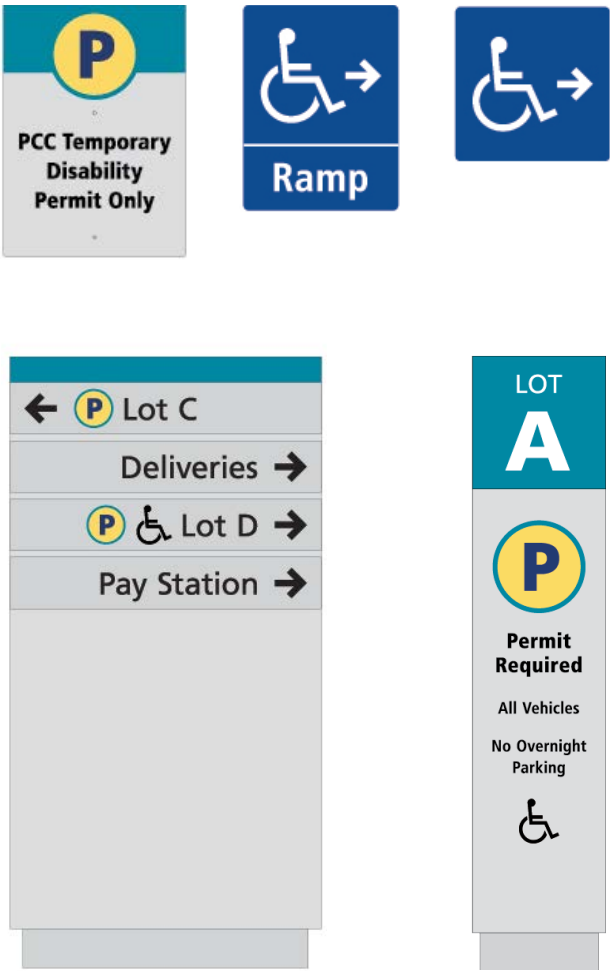
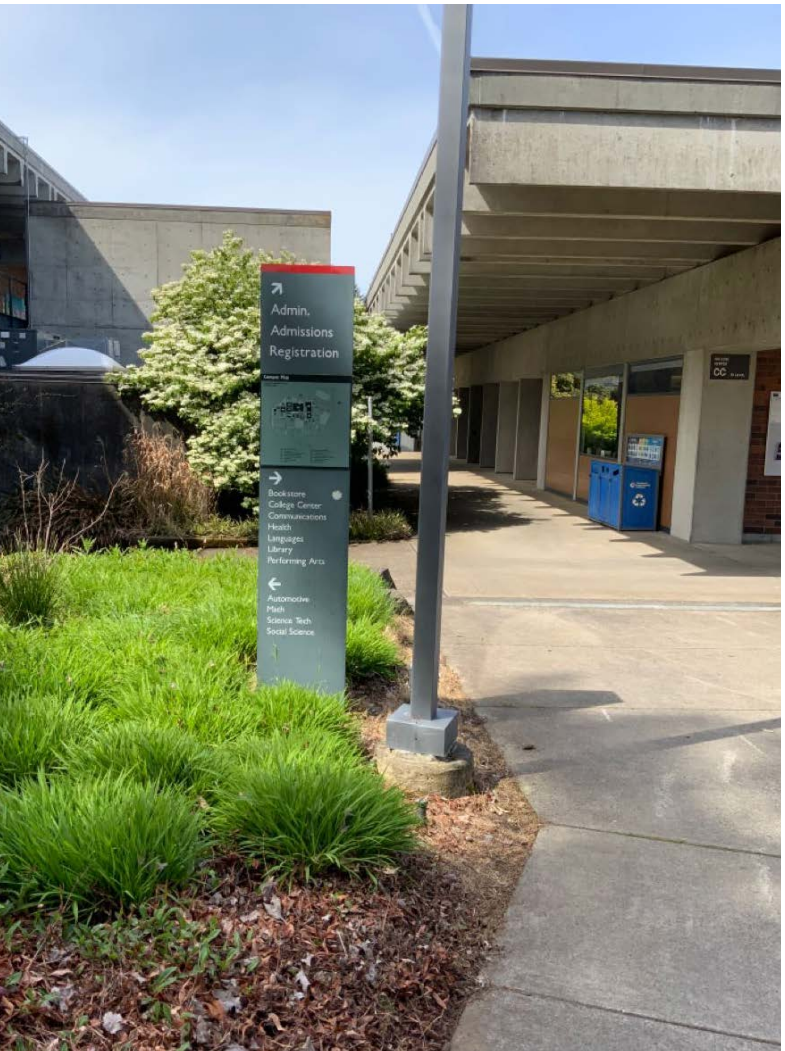


WAYFINDING ASSESSMENT

Accessibility

The images on this page reflect the numerous challenges to accessibility throughout the Sylvania campus. Signage is inconsistent in messaging, not accessible due to placement, and makes an already-difficult campus even harder to navigate.

USER JOURNEYS

Defining the use case of wayfinding at the Sylvania campus

A broad range of users navigate the Sylvania campus each day, including students, staff, faculty, and visitors.

From students changing classes each term to faculty and staff who have deep knowledge of the site, there is no one-size-fits-all form of wayfinding. Bora created a series of user journeys to develop an understanding of the unique challenges facing four different groups.

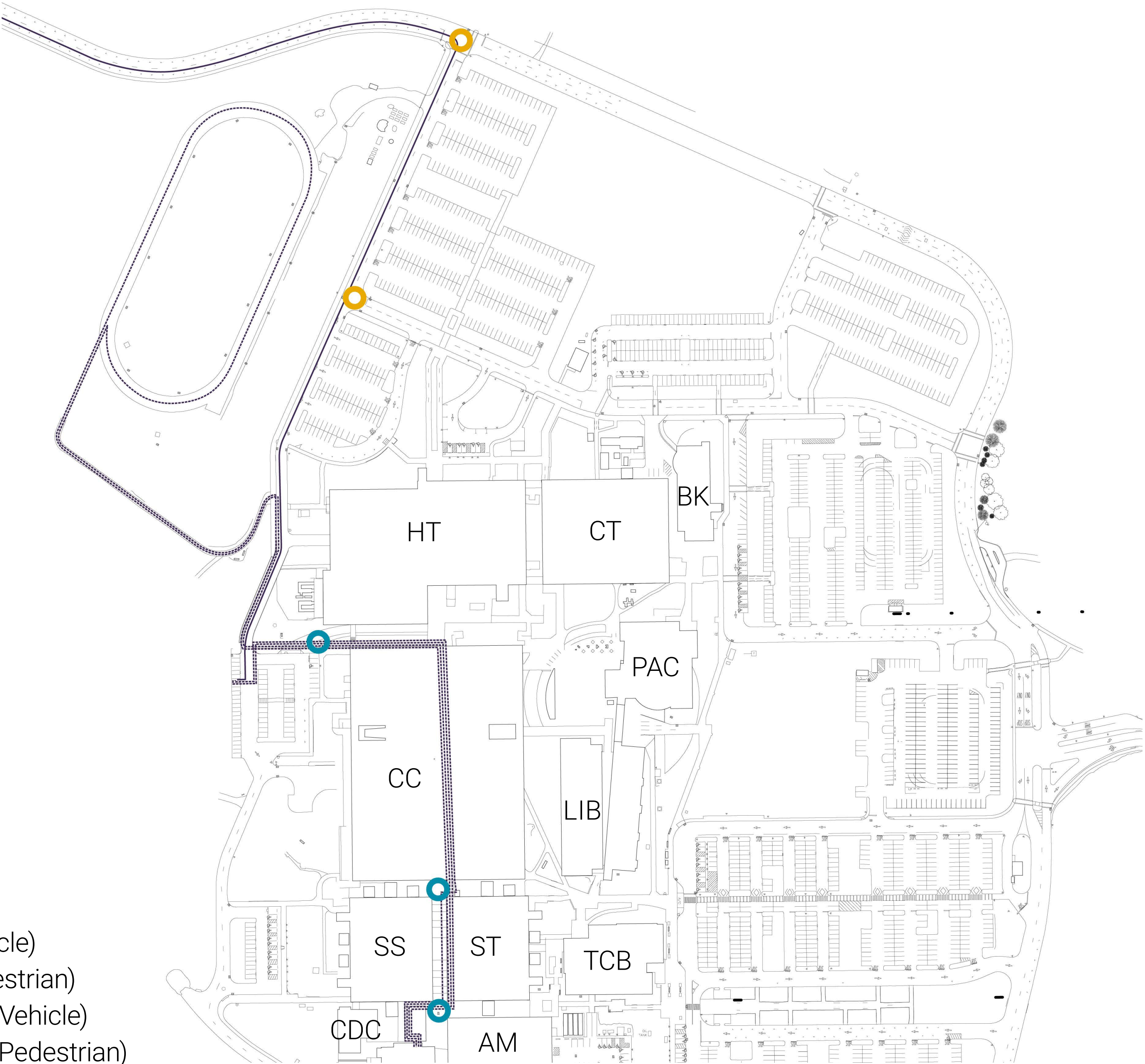
USER JOURNEY: FACULTY ARRIVING BY CAR

Professor Smith has taught at Sylvania for 11 years. On Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays he has two classes in the SCB.

- Today, he arrives to campus from the **Lesser Ave entrance** and finds a great spot to park in **Lot 1**.
- For Smith’s lecture this week he brought extra supplies for a demonstration he planned. Smith walks to the **SCB** and decides to take the elevator due to the extra load.
- Once his morning class is complete, Smith stops by the **CC** to grab lunch.
- The sun is out today so Smith decides to take a walk around the **track** during his lunch break.
- After lunch, Smith teaches his afternoon course in the **SCB** and then walks back to his car in **Lot 1** to go home for the day.



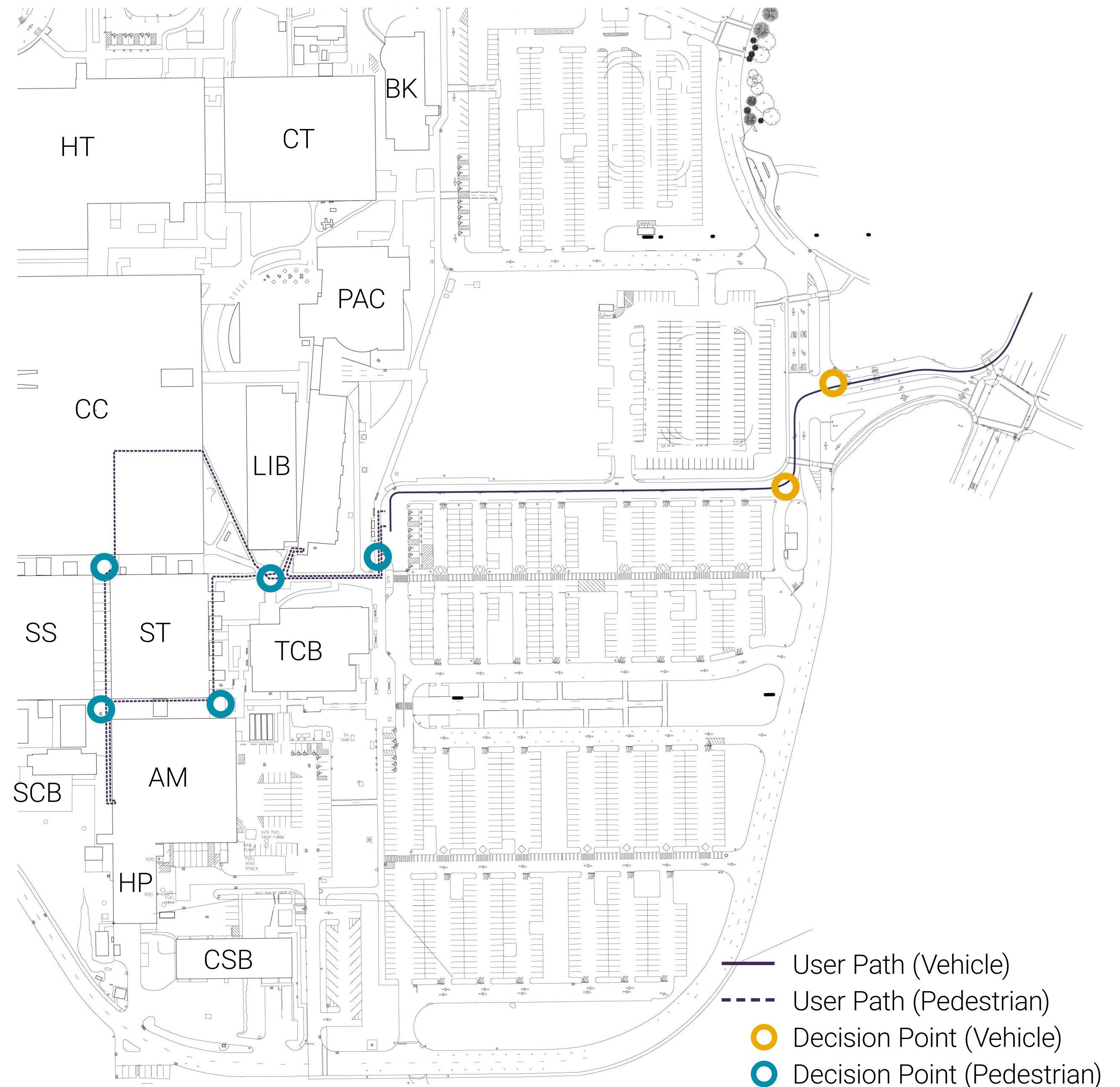

USER JOURNEY: CURRENT STUDENT ARRIVING BY BUS

Eric is a second year student at PCC.

- On Tuesdays and Thursdays Eric arrives to campus on the city bus through the **Kerr Parkway entrance**.
- The bus drops him off **in front of the Library** at 8:42am—just in time to grab coffee at the CC before his 9:00am class.
- Eric waits in line at the **River City Café** and then heads to his mechanics class in the **AM building**.
- His class is released a few minutes early so Eric decides to walk to the **Library** to study for his upcoming exam before his bus arrives.
- Ten minutes before the bus, Eric packs up and walks toward the **bus stop**. The bus pulls up a couple minutes late, Eric swipes his Hop card, and he finds a seat for the ride home.



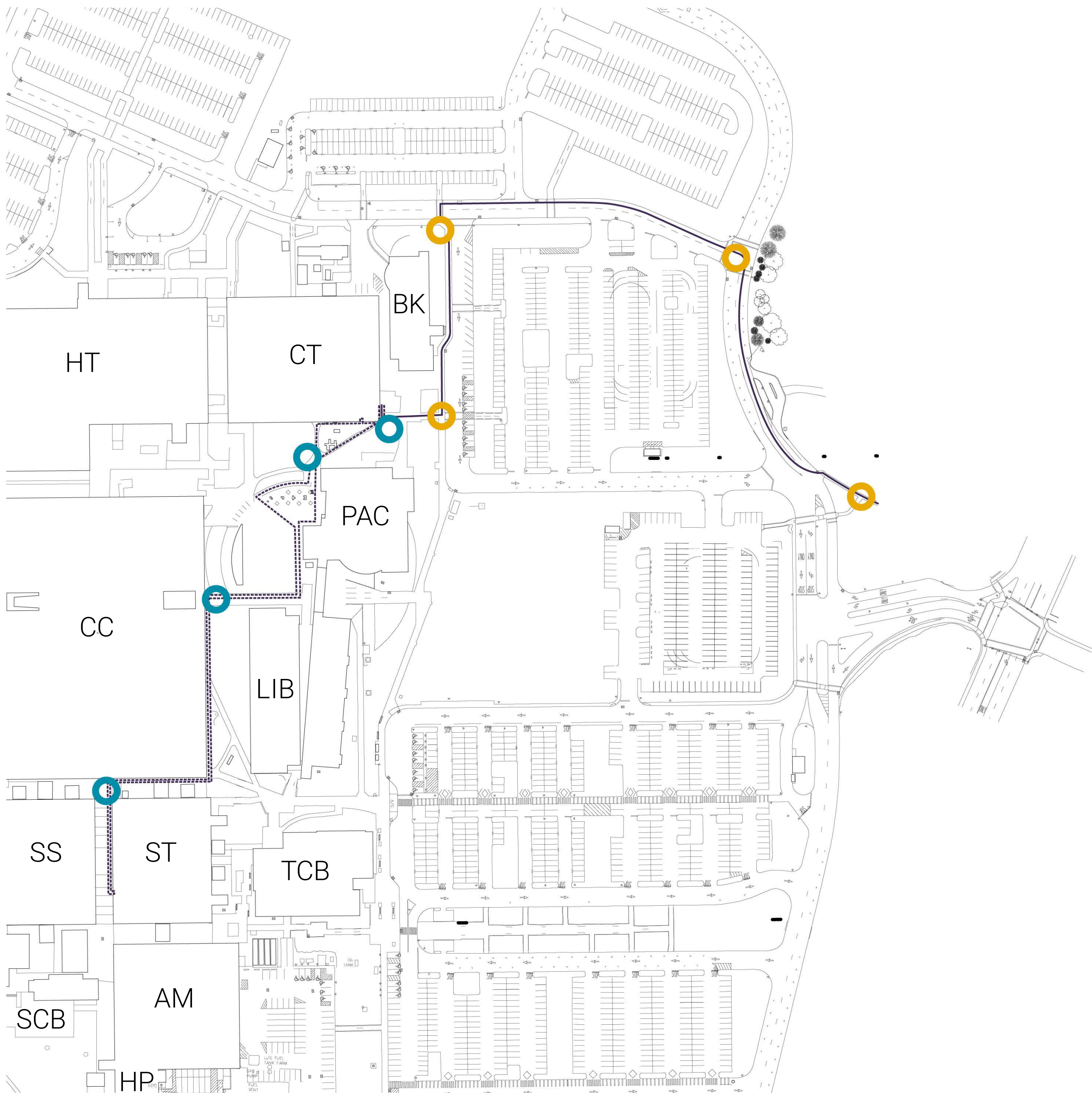
USER JOURNEY: CURRENT STUDENT ARRIVING BY BIKE

Alex is a first year PCC student. They decide to ride their bike to campus to take advantage of the good weather.

- Alex turns off 49th Ave and onto **K St.** where the bike path leads them to G St. Alex rides to the CT building where there is **bike parking** next to their first class.
- Alex locks up their bike and walks into the Little Theater in the **CT building.**
- After they are done, Alex packs up and finds a spot to eat their lunch **outside the PAC.** They enjoy the sun and chat with some of their classmates who came to join them.
- Lunch ends and Alex finds their way to the **ST building** for their last class of the day.
- Alex heads back to their bike and they prepare for their ride home.

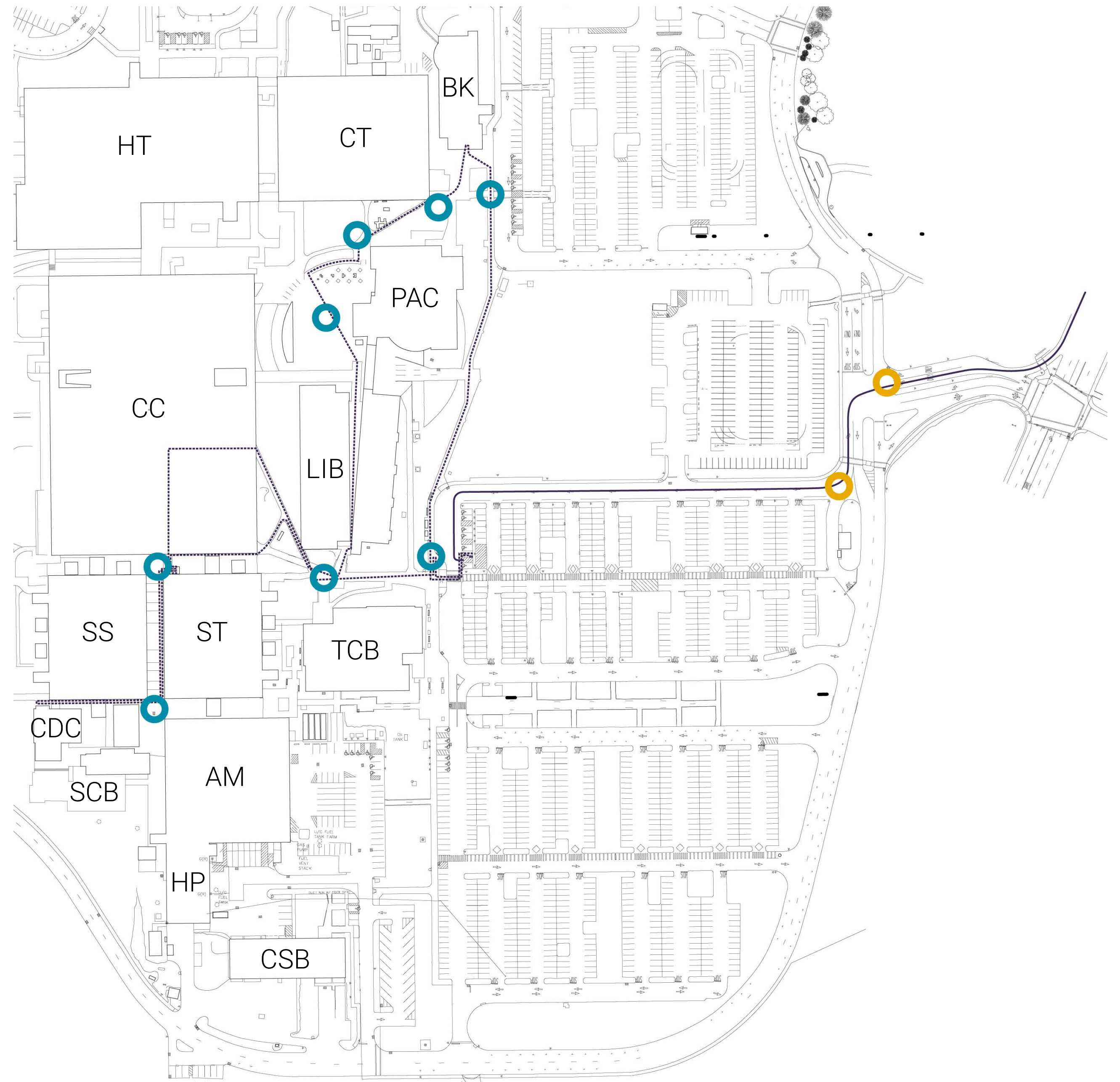
USER JOURNEY: PROSPECTIVE STUDENT WITH MOBILITY CHALLENGES

Emily is visiting Sylvania campus—excited about the possibility of taking courses in the fall.

- Emily arrives from the **Kerr Parkway entrance** and finds accessible parking in **Lot 7**. She is unfamiliar with the campus, so Emily finds a map.
- She decides to visit the CC, the Library, and the Bookstore. Emily finds her way to the **CC** where she learns about the CDC.
- Emily is interested in Sylvania's Early Education Program and is excited when she hears about an opportunity to work with children in the CDC. Emily leaves the CC, finds an elevator outside the ST building, and heads toward the **CDC** on a lower level.
- She walks around the building property and then decides it is time to check out the **Library**. Emily returns to the same elevator.
- After touring the Library, Emily walks to the **Bookstore** and then back to **Parking Lot 7**—eager to start researching courses.

MAJOR DECISION POINTS

Identifying major wayfinding decision points at the Sylvania campus

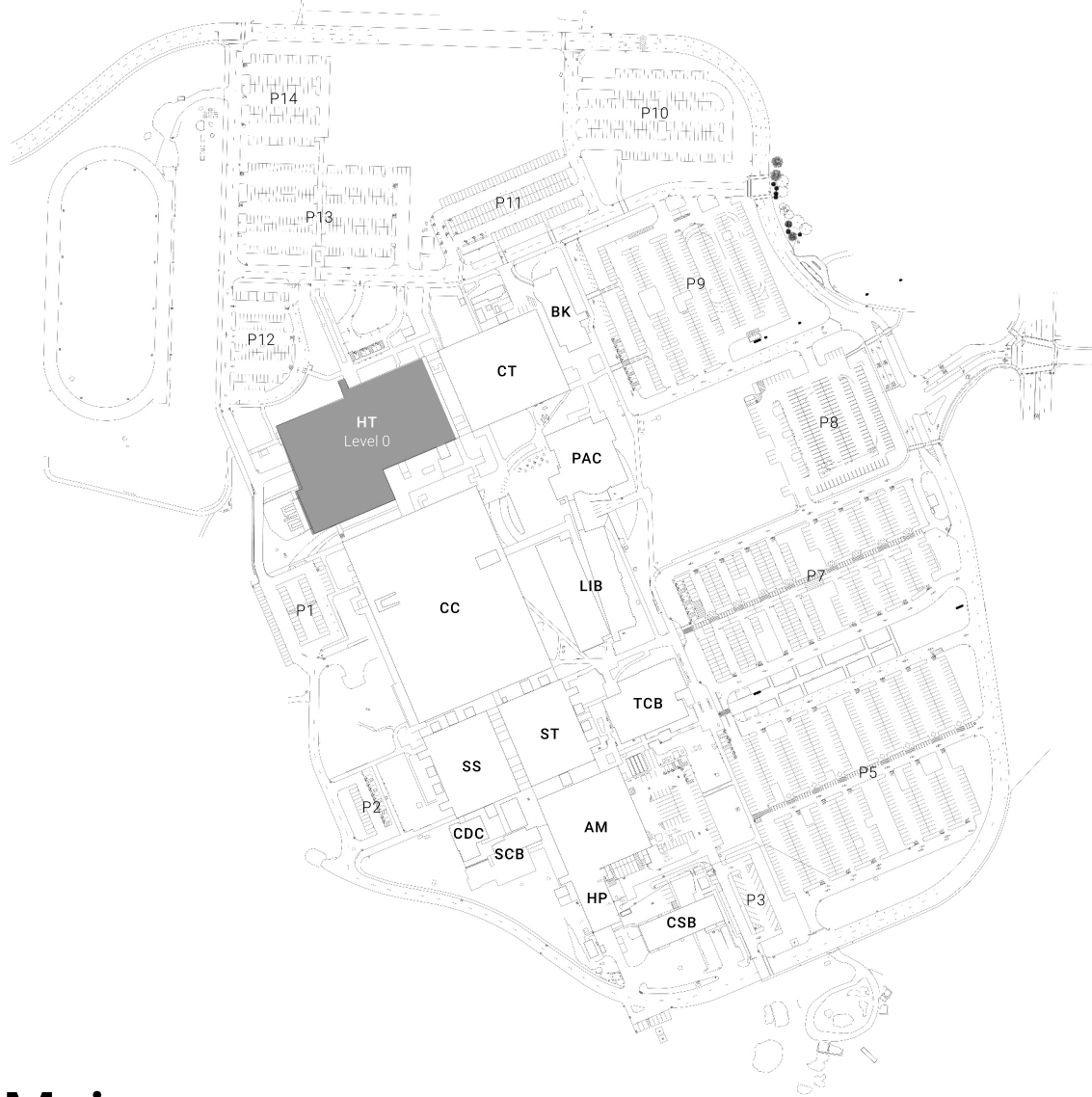
Because of the complex topography of the Sylvania campus, it is challenging to label the levels in a clear and consistent way. Levels in one building may not match adjacent buildings due to the sloping site.

Bora created a system of identification using the College Center (CC) building as the main baseline, creating a cross-section of the site plan to identify various levels across campus. Building levels are categorized based on this relationship to the CC building. This is especially helpful in identifying exterior decision points throughout campus that may occur at the same point on multiple levels.

The following site plans are intended to help determine potential wayfinding locations. They are not intended for final map artwork on signage.
