




Spring Workshop and Online Survey Summary



Survey Overview

In April 2021, PCC’s Office of Planning & Capital Construction held a series of campus visioning workshops to inform the college’s district-wide Facilities Plan. At these workshops, we heard input from students, staff, faculty, and community members on the essence, values, and vision for physical space at each campus; feedback about issues and concerns around campus spaces; and opportunities for future development and open space to better support community needs and PCC’s mission of equitable student success. An online campus survey was launched alongside the campus workshop to gather information from those who could not attend the workshops.

The themes and takeaways summarized below will directly inform long-term changes to the physical environment of PCC’s campuses over the next 20 years or more.

- 4 Students



Themes from participants’ input below.


Cascade Campus


Sylvania Campus


Southeast Campus

- It would be helpful to have an information desk area. Signage or landscaping would help identify a welcome center or main entrance. Hardscape nods, like a brick archway.
- Use the church parking lot and then park by the kiln/art studios by the trees. It feels safe and has a button to push if feeling threatened.



Themes from participants' input below.

Cascade Campus

- Create a welcome area for students, with a staff person to help direct students at entry of building.
- Improve bike facilities, including covered bike parking.
- Improve and enhance Wifi access, specifically in parking garage.

Rock Creek Campus

- Improve ADA accessibility including ADA parking, accessible sidewalks and trails, and entrances to buildings (automatic doors).
- Increase pedestrian and bike safety and accessibility, especially in parking lots.

Sylvania Campus

- Improve directional signage, with signs in multiple languages.
- Create a clear entrance to campus.
- Create a welcome area for students.
- Improve pedestrian and bike safety and access.
- Improve the safety of navigating the campus in wet or icy conditions.

How could buildings be made more welcoming at PCC? What types of indoor spaces and amenities does this campus need more of to support student success?

Themes from participants' input below.

Cascade Campus

- Improve spaces for study, work, relaxing, and gathering, specifically in PSEB, Jackson Hall.
- Improve directional signage.
- Improve Gym including easier access, more storage space and noise reduction.
- Cluster student services/programs in common area.
- Create warm, inviting environment with better lighting, brighter colors, and student artwork.
- Improve building access/circulation on campus, specifically stairwells in Library and Student Service Building.

Rock Creek Campus

- Improve ADA accessibility of furniture
- Create warm, inviting environment with more natural light, plants, and student artwork.
- Locate student services in easy to find locations.
- More private areas for students, staff and faculty to meet for confidential conversations; create “safe spaces.”

Sylvania Campus

- Create warm, inviting environment with more natural light, plants, and student artwork, specifically in the Cafeteria.
- Improve food options on campus.
- Improve/increase spaces for study, work, relaxing, and gathering.
- Add storage or lockers for students.

Southeast Campus

- Improve and enlarge the exercise/fitness area on campus; provide an open gym to students, staff and faculty.
- Improve and increase spaces for meetings, small group gatherings, classes, programs and community uses.

Respondents selected their top three from a list of 12 improvements. Top answers from each campus below:

Cascade Campus

- Study spaces for individuals/ small groups.
- Spaces for students to access computers/devices, Wifi, charging stations, and other technology.

Rock Creek Campus

- Directional signage making it easier to access services and find destinations.
- More visible/welcoming student resource areas (tutoring, advising, financial aid, career centers, etc.).
- Spaces for students to access computers/devices, Wifi, charging stations, and other technology.

Sylvania Campus

- Directional signage making it easier to access services and find destinations.
- Natural light and views of greenery.

Southeast Campus

- Affordable housing that is open to students and community members.

Housing

As part of future development, PCC is exploring the potential for partnerships with affordable housing developers. How would affordable housing fit within your vision for future development at this campus?

Themes from participants' input below.



Virtual Workshop

Cascade Campus

- Opportunity to support students.
- Concerns include parking limitations; overdeveloping natural spaces; where it would be located on campus; who would have priority; and the need to have students or residents connected with supportive programs.

Rock Creek Campus

- PCC could offer housing vouchers or work-study, work-to-live options that would support students.
- Opportunity to partner with other organizations and jurisdictional partners.
- Concerns include parking limitations; overdeveloping natural spaces; and lack of easy access to grocery store or other amenities.

Sylvania Campus

- Opportunity to support students and vulnerable communities.
- Affordable housing could create a strong campus community.
- Concerns include parking limitations; safety issues; lack of easy access to grocery store or other amenities; and who will have priority.

Southeast Campus

- Housing could integrate childcare center and partner with other organizations.
- Concerns include parking limitations and limited space on campus.



Next Steps

Your input will directly inform a draft vision and ideas about how to improve PCC's physical campuses over the next 20 years. The input received this spring from workshops, surveys, and listening sessions will guide the Facilities Planning team as we create draft "future development frameworks" for each PCC campus over the summer. The future development frameworks will indicate where future development could take place as PCC grows, and how the physical campus can be improved to support equity, a sense of community and belonging, and to support PCC's educational mission of equitable student success.

In the Fall of 2021, we will share draft ideas with PCC students, staff, faculty, and community members to ask for feedback through an online survey. With your help, we will refine the ideas for each campus by the end of 2021. We hope you will continue to stay involved with this project!
