Session 1: Embracing Intentional Defiance: How to Help Students to Aim Higher Than What is Expected

Presenter: Wilson Nitunga

Description: It is not uncommon for underserved students to receive academic counseling advice to lower their expectations. This session discusses the academic agency of underrepresented students and the responsibility of higher education to recognize and contest deficit thinking that devalues learners as unable to succeed due to their background.







Session 2: Trauma Informed and Strengths-Based Response to Students Impacted by Violence

**Presenters:** Caroline Bartlett & Hayley Hayes

Description: In this interactive session, staff from the Outreach and Advocacy Project will explore the important role community colleges can play in supporting financial independence and resiliency for victims/survivors of violence. This includes exploring the role faculty can have in creating safe(r) learning environments; practicing responses that promote healing; and learning about campus resources available to students.





Session 3: When Students Get Stuck: Helping Students Navigate Disciplinary Bottlenecks

Presenters: Jessica Lee, Allison Gross & Karen Embry

Description: Many students in college feel like "strangers in a strange land." One thing that exacerbates that experience and contributes to students feeling like "outsiders" is a lack of familiarity with the idea of disciplinarity. Understanding how to navigate the different disciplines require different habits of mind and ways of seeing the world that are not often articulated explicitly for students and can result in them not succeeding in a course.

Session 1: #StandUpFG and the Power of Place-Based Learning at PCC

Description: In May 2016, thousands of local youth participated in walkouts to support Latinx students at Forest Grove High School. These massive protests helped to spark a statewide movement for Ethnic Studies that resulted in the passing of the nation's first law requiring statewide Ethnic Studies standards for all K-12 students. Explore the digital exhibition created for Five Oaks Museum and learn how promote place based, cross-curricular experiences that center the histories of local communities of color.







Session 2: Classroom Activities to Support Trauma-Informed Pedagogy and Healing

Description: In an interactive presentation learn how trauma may impact students' and instructors' experience(s) in the classroom. Participants will explore activities that can be offered in both remote and on-campus classrooms to help address this trauma and support the healing process. Session 1: Increasing Sense of Academic Belonging through Persistence: A Pilot Project

Description: The Computing and Engineering Division embarked on the Persistence Project in the Fall of 2021 to help students connect in a meaningful way with their instructors. Instructors committed to get to know their students holistically and talked with students about their goals and challenges. The panel will discuss the four behavioral commitments that were implemented by instructors in the classroom and the results of the project.







Session 2: Part One|Confronting White Nationalism at PCC: A Panel Discussion

Description: This session will provide context and analysis on bigoted assaults on higher education across the country and at Portland Community College. Panelists will share history, perspectives and strategies for confronting white nationalism in our communities. We will discuss what white nationalism is, its deep roots in Oregon and Portland specifically, and what we can do about it at PCC. An overview of PCC's current Confronting White Nationalism initiative, the Confronting White Nationalism toolkit and ways to get involved in this work will be discussed.

This session is part of a two part series on confronting white nationalism in higher education. Participants who attend Part One of the session are invited to take part in an interactive workshop in the afternoon (1:30 -3:00 PM) that will focus on scenarios in the classroom and strategies for confronting white nationalism as an instructor in any discipline. \*Please note this is a 60 minute session.

Description: We work within a community in support of student success. Furthermore, these roles are broken down into subcategories like "CTE instructors", "Center Director", "Gen Ed Bio course instructor", and so on. Perhaps students do not see themselves in this fragmented way. Through the voices of participants and panelists, we will engage in dialogue and leave with a better understanding of our college ecosystem and its interacting parts. With a better understanding, perhaps we can be more successful as collaborative agents of holistic student support.

Session 1: The Classroom Experience of Students with Autism

Description: Autism is one of the most prevalent, but least understood neurodivergent conditions among students. Many reputable sources provide helpful information regarding what autism is, how it can manifest in different people and the core commonalities between autistic individuals. However, some sources offer misinformation, perpetuating very negative and dangerous stereotypes. This session breaks down what autism actually is, the core commonalities and misconceptions about autism and the importance of using specific language/phrases to make a classroom environment more inclusive for autistic students. The session offers instructors the opportunity to hear from people with autism and to ask questions about autism, including how to make their classroom more welcoming for all their students. \*Please note limited registration for this session. Capacity for only 25 participants. This session will not be recorded.





Session 2: Critical Reflection: Deepening students' Connection to Community through Shared Understanding of Lived Experiences Presenters: Ari Petrides, Catherine Thomas, Hannah Cherry & Taryn Oakley

Description: Reflection and critical thinking are at the heart of transformative learning. As a core element of experiential learning, they help students to make connections between coursework (theories, readings, themes and skill sets) and real-world application. As educators, we can incorporate a deeper level of reflection, critical reflection, so that students can integrate their personal values, challenge normative assumptions, and make meaning of their experiences for further action.
