

# Funding Your Study Abroad Program



Thank you for watching the First Steps Video series. Let's take a look at various ways you can fund your study abroad program.



We recognize that thinking about the costs of study abroad program may feel overwhelming. We consider a study abroad experience an investment in yourself. In this video we will look at a variety of options available to finance your overall experience. These are not your only options. Our broad categories include using financial aid, applying for scholarships, and raising personal funds. You will likely use a combination of these.



We are not Financial Aid professionals and do not want to offer wrong information, so we recommend talking to Financial Aid Advisors EARLY in this process. Do not make assumptions about your Financial Aid package! Everyone's Aid package is different.

#### Financial Resources: Scholarships

We encourage all students to apply to these scholarships:

- PCC Foundation
- PCC Ed Abroad Scholarship (within the Foundation Scholarship)
- Fund for Ed Abroad

If you are eligible to receive a Pell grant, we encourage you to also apply for:

• Gilman Scholarship









We encourage all PCC students to apply for the PCC Foundation Scholarship. The PCC Foundation raises over 2 million dollars to give to students each year. This is one scholarship application for over 250 scholarships specifically for PCC students. Last year the average scholarship award was \$1800 and 1600 students received awards. This is a no brainer!

One of the scholarships offered within the Foundation is our own PCC Education Abroad Scholarship. To apply for the Education Abroad Scholarship, you need to apply for the overall Foundation Scholarship. Our specific Ed Abroad scholarship opens each December and has a mid February deadline.

If you receive a Pell grant you should apply for the Gilman Scholarship. This national study abroad scholarship awards students between \$1000-\$5000 to study abroad. The Gilman Scholarship is meant to encourage first generation college students, Community College Students, students of underrepresented backgrounds, and STEAM students the chance to go abroad. The Gilman Scholarship has October and March deadlines. Our office works closely with students to put together an application, so please reach out to us for help.

Applying for a scholarship can be intimidating, so here are some tips!

Keep in mind the deadlines and make a plan with these in mind.

You have resources available to you to help - online videos, past scholarship winners, advisors wanting to help. The Foundation holds scholarship workshops and our office is happy to help as well.

Understand what is required as part of the application - do you need to ask for recommendations or transcripts? These take time to obtain. Advisors and previous instructors are happy to support students in this way, so don't feel badly about. Many scholarships do not have any additional requirements.

Find an editor - I will say it many times, we advisors are happy to be a second pair of eyes to review your essays. This really helps bring your scholarship application to the next level.

#### **Scholarship Essay Considerations** Essay Questions 101: Share YOUR story: ✓ Be Passionate, Personal, Descriptive Answer the ✓ Make yourself memorable scholarship ✓ Be specific (too general = too boring) ✓ Create clear connection between the essay program and what you want to do questions. (mention your goals, hopes, and dreams). ✓ Include specific program highlights that get you excited about this experience. Consider the info you provide in the scholarship application: Organize your Avoid Plagiarism thoughts: create an outline What does the reader know about you? like the first, then expand. What **should** the reader know about you? plague

Most scholarships have essays of some kind as a part of the application. Often you can re-use a lot of what you have written.

When starting your essay - the first tip may be obvious but is often ignored - answer the questions that are being asked in the scholarship.


Consider what personal information you are asked as you begin the application, and think about what you want the reader to know about you. Consider the selection criteria if it is published (Gilman has very clear selection criteria, for example) and highlight any life experience you have in these areas within your essays.

Overall, you should share your story. It is specific. Be passionate, be personal, be descriptive. Writing specifics tells the reader more about you - avoid general statements. Create a clear connection to the program you are choosing and your goals - what you hope to do - academically or professionally. Highlight specifics from the program that are exciting to you and explain why. These pieces make your essay more memorable. You want the reader to say to herself, "I want to give this student money!"

And remember, having a second pair of eyes read through your essays can help bring them to the next level.

## **Scholarship Timeline Considerations**

- Scholarship notification windows vary (December May)
- Result: you may need to submit your \$500 deposit to your program **BEFORE** learning if you have received a scholarship






In general, the timing of scholarship notifications is awkward. You MAY need to commit to your study abroad program (and pay the non-refundable deposit) BEFORE learning you have received a scholarship award.

## Scholarship = Bonus \$\$\$





This means that you should not rely on scholarship money to pay for your program and make sure you have a Plan B. Consider the scholarship money a bonus.



This is why we like to look holistically at your finances - to consider all of your options to fund your trip.



Consider creative
(and less creative)

This brings us to our final category, looking at ways to raise personal funds for a study abroad experience.

## Personal Fundraising (AKA Your Plan B)



Do you have any savings, or a way to start building your savings?

Consider taking on extra Shifts at Work if possible, to start putting away a little bit of money starting now. This will go a long way!

If you have generous family or friends, consider asking for money for your Holiday and Birthday gifts.

We encourage students to be creative and consider your own talents/community to help with some fundraising. Other students in your program cohort may be in the same position, and together you can work together to come up with a bigger project. One year a team of students worked together and made and sold tamales. They earned over \$700! If it feels right for your situation, consider getting a credit card for small but immediate payments. Keep in mind the interest and deadlines.

Consider personal private loans if you feel they are right for you.

PCC payment plan may be an option depending on your departure date - this breaks down the fee so you can pay over time, but needs to be fully paid

before departure.

Crowdfunding Campaigns may be another option if you feel comfortable.
