### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Gouache (Pronounced "Gwash") is the original illustrator's medium with it's own unique and wonderful features! Gouache has enjoyed a resurgence of popularity recently with social media art "challenges" and quality inexpensive introductory paint sets. This class will introduce you to skills and techniques using gouache paint for illustration and fine art. Learn to use transparent and opaque layers, color mixing techniques, brush strokes and color testing. Create a finished art piece using the techniques learned in class.

MATERIALS (Please read this list carefully, and read the notes at the bottom)

- Paint, Brushes and Palette: Choose from Option 1 or 2 below this list.
- Watercolor or Mixed Media paper 8x10 to 9x12 (I really like the Strathmore Visual Journal Watercolor paper, but any decent 90lb and above water media paper is fine.)
- Pencil, any, mechanical or regular, hb or harder is recommended so you can erase it off your paper.
- Erasers white and moldable
- Sketchbook same size as paper. Or printer paper is fine, sketches will be rough.
- 2 water containers Jars, mugs, yogurt containers, anything works.
- Paper towels or rags
- Tape: Artist's tape or washi tape is best. Painters tape might work but it might tear the paper. I've seen people use electrical tape and cello tape.
- Small palette knife. Plastic is fine.
- Misting spray bottle of water
- Fine white posca pen
- Micron Drawing Pen/s

# Option 1 (much less expensive, may show brushstrokes more but is still very good): NOTE: do NOT transport sideways once the paint is opened! It will leak everywhere!

- Himi "Jelly Paint" set, at least 24 colors, It comes with a palette and a few basic brushes.
  (Found online, not available in stores! Buy ahead of time to account for shipping.)

- Additional brushes optional:
  - o #1 or #2 Rigger
  - #1 Point Brush
  - #8 or #10 round faux squirrel watercolor brush.
- Flat plastic, paper or glass palette, or white plate, if you want something bigger than the included palette.

(Note: Himi/Miya paints are excellent to work with, but are not considered "professional grade" simply because some colors are not as lightfast. Final work may fade if displayed over long term. However, this can also happen with expensive professional grade gouache.)

# Option 2 (build your own, significantly more expensive, may have a better outcome)

- Gouache Paint (\*See note) (NOT acryla or acrylic gouache!)
  - Primary Cyan
  - Primary Magenta
  - Primary Yellow
  - o Black, any
  - Titanium White
  - Any other colors you like! It is helpful to have purple, green, orange, and brown, but best to go with your gut!

- Acrylic style brushes (inexpensive is fine, gouache is not picky):
  - o #8 flat brush
  - o #6 Round
  - o #8 Filbert
  - #1 or #2 Rigger or Long Round brush
  - o #1 Point Brush
- #8 or #10 round faux squirrel watercolor brush.
- Any other brushes you like to use.
- Plastic, glass or paper palette, or a white plate
- Something to store mixed paint or whole palette in, or an airtight palette.

# **Optional Supplies:**

- Hair dryer (I'll bring one for the class)
- Cold wax medium for preservation (you won't need it until later.)
- Masonite or similar board to tape your paper to.

#### \*Note:

Excellent pro but expensive brands: Holbein, Windsor and Newton, Schminke. A little goes a long way. Lightfastness displayed on tube.

Less expensive but decent brands: Rembrandt/Royal Talens, Caran D'Ache, Arteza

Do NOT buy: Reeves, Art Advantage or Artist's Loft. ArrtX might be OK but I personally think if you are going that route, just buy the Himi set.

Acrylic gouache is an entirely different medium that I haven't used. You can get other effects with it, if you want to try it that's OK but I may not have as much advice.

Where to buy: Himi sets are available online, I'm not sure if anyone local has them. Everything else can be purchased at any local art supply store or online. Amazon, Dick Blick and Jerry's Artarama are good online sources.
