DISCUSSION ITEMS:

• Standardization of the titles of categories of General Education List

- Due to the evolution of PCC's current, single General Education/Discipline Studies list, the titles for the three categories are used inconsistently in the Handbook and therefore in the catalog and other publications; the first category is variously called "Arts and Letters" or "Arts and Humanities", the second "Social Science", or "Social Sciences", and the third "Science/Math/Computer Science" or "Mathematics, Natural and Physical Sciences, Computer Studies".
- o The titles of the categories will be:
 - Arts and Letters
 - Social Sciences
 - Science/Math/Computer Science
- NOTE: No changes to the definitions of each category or courses within categories are being proposed. This proposal is only to standardize the titles used for each category. These titles follow the categories used by the State of Oregon for the AAOT. They cannot be changed or modified.
