REPORT:

The Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree in Electrician Apprenticeship Technologies and its accompanying certificates constitute one of three apprenticeship pathways established as a statewide apprenticeship program designed to replace existing apprenticeship training opportunities in Oregon community colleges. Implementation of the statewide

apprenticeship program will allow students to pursue specific apprenticeship pathways in order to meet the demands of the industry. Students can transfer related training and prior certification credits to any participating Oregon community college by virtue of a block transfer

articulation agreement. The certificates serve as pathways to the Associate of Applied Science degree,

eighty-seven (87) credits of which may apply to a Bachelor of Science degree in Operations Management at the Oregon Institute of Technology. A comprehensive plan is in place to assist current students through the transition to the statewide program.

RECOMMENDATION: That the College be authorized to submit an application to the Oregon State Board of Education: Associate of Applied Science: Electrician Apprenticeship Technologies; Certificate: Electrician Apprenticeship Technologies; Certificate: Limited Apprenticeship Technologies for Portland Community College, Tillamook Bay Community College, and Columbia Gorge Community College
