RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO INITIATIVE MEASURE 58

REPORT:

The Portland Community College Board of Directors opposes passage of Measure 58, which would prescribe the way that teachers teach English to speakers of other languages.

Analysis:

 Measure 58 does not accommodate children with special language or learning needs.

 Similar laws were passed in California in 1998, in Arizona in 2000 and in Massachusetts in 2002. In none of those cases did academic outcomes improve.

 Research in the field of pedagogy do not back the contention that limiting education in a student's first language is efficacious.

 The measure does not specify how the system would work, who qualifies for the program and how it would be implemented.

The measure would have a fiscal impact on public schools, which already are under-funded.

Measure 58 was written by Bill Sizemore, who has not been trained in pedagogy.

Findings:

 Classroom teachers, administrators and elected school board members are better situated to know which classroom activities are "best practices."

 Oregon's 197 public school districts already provide opportunity for parents to provide input on classroom practices.

 English-only mandates in other states have not improved academic outcomes. RECOMMENDATION: The Portland Community College Board of Directors urges all students and community members to become fully informed regarding Measure 58, and to carefully consider the negative consequences for students throughout Oregon.
