On Campus Employment

 F-1 students are generally permitted to work part-time on the premises of the school that issued their currently valid I-20. They must be attending that school and maintaining their F-1 status

Two on campus employment types:

- Student Employee
 - Casual Employee

F-1 students are not eligible for Work Study Positions

More on Campus Work....

- Location: Must be considered "on-campus". If student is required to travel for campus job for short periods, this would be acceptable (retreats, conferences, etc)
- Duration: Can be used throughout period student is pursuing a full course of study.
- Hours per week: Limited to 20 hours per week (total) while school is in session
- Exception 1: full-time during vacation periods: Oncampus employment may be full-time during summer and other vacation periods (holidays, short breaks in between terms) for students who are eligible and intend to register for the subsequent academic term.

Examples of On-Campus Work:

Student Leader

- Computer Resource Assistant
 - Front Desk Assistant in Gym
- Office Assistant/Receptionist

How do I Find a Job?

- Visit a department in person, ask when a job may open for students
 - Visit the 'Student Life' tab on MyPCC

*Generally, departments may hire spring term for the following year OR each term during the first two weeks of the term

What's Next?

- 1) Obtain a letter from employer stating you have been offered a job on campus. Letter must be on PCC letterhead and state the nature of the job and number of hours worked per week.
- 2) Obtain employment authorization letter from an International Student Advisor
- 3) Apply for a social security number. You may start working once you have a receipt that shows you have applied for a social security card and have presented this to your employer

What is a Social Security Card?

- In the United States, a Social Security number
 (SSN) is a nine-digit number issued to US Citizens,
 permanent residents, and temporary (working)
 residents
- Its primary purpose is to track individuals for taxation purposes.

Other Work Options – Off Campus

Most F-1 students studying at the college and university level can seek authorization for practical training to engage in temporary employment to gain practical experience in his/her field of study.

There are two types of practical training:

- Curricular practical training (CPT)
- Optional practical training (OPT)

Other Work Options – Off Campus

 Volunteerism (non-paid) – You may volunteer for as many hours as you like without approval from an advisor.

However, must not accept any goods or services in exchange for your volunteerism.

NOT ACCEPTABLE

 Paid, off-campus work without prior approval

 Receiving any kind of compensation for volunteerism

 Personal ventures where profit is made (example: a personal business)
